

DVCRA Board Allocates \$500 to Build Its Membership

WELCOME to our newest members who joined DVCRA in 2021: Julie Catalano, Steve Coccimiglio, Sue Handy, Ray Gilmore, Milagros Ojermark, and Lee Rode! We are very happy to have you join us and hope you find DVCRA an excellent way to

stay connected to friends and colleagues and continue to support students at DVC, particularly through our scholarship fund.

As of December 2021, we have 148 members who paid their dues for 2021-22. That number is a slight increase over the previous year, which is very good, but still much lower than where our active membership stood in 2015-16, which was 173 dues-paying members. The DVCRA Board has continued to look for ways to increase our membership, and at its most recent meeting in January, voted to allocate \$500.00 toward instituting ways to communicate to DVC active faculty, staff, and management about DVCRA's mission and activities.

One way you can help build our membership right now is to **invite a colleague to our luncheon on April 29.** If you know a retiree whose membership has lapsed or who hasn't joined, or someone within five years of retiring and interested in knowing more about DVCRA, invite them to join you on April 29 and their lunch will be **FREE**. Just let **Irene Menegas** know that you are inviting someone when you RSVP for the luncheon.

It's still too early to pay your dues for 2022-23 but watch for an email message in mid-June for information about membership renewal and scholarship donations. Financial Report

January 1 to December 31, 2021

The primary purpose of the DVCRA's fundraising is to award scholarships to DVC students. The association has awarded scholarships for many years. From 2008 through 2021 we have provided 126

scholarships to our worthy students. Our major fundraising efforts occur during the summer and we award and fund scholarships in the spring. In other words, the funds raised in 2021 will be used to fund scholarships in 2022.

The following DVCRA financial information is for the period January 1 to December 31, 2021:

- We have **\$36,397** in cash held in our bank accounts with Travis Credit Union and the DVC Foundation.
- These monies will be used to fund the 20 scholarships approved by the DVCRA Board for 2022. Additionally, we have two scholarships in 2021 that were awarded but not claimed as of December 31, 2021. If these two scholarships are not claimed by June 30, 2022, the funds will revert back to the DVCRA.
- Our fundraising activities (including donations, memberships, and auctions) generated **\$21,135** available for scholarships.
- We had **\$17,147** in expenditures. Included in this total were: **\$16,000** in scholarships, **\$835** for fall luncheon expenses, and **\$262** for office expenses.

The DVCRA Board has approved 20 scholarships of **\$1,000** for 2022. This will bring our total to **\$146,000** in scholarships awarded to students since 2008.

2022 scholarships to be awarded:

- 11 continuing student scholarships
- 6 transfer student scholarships
- 1 transfer student scholarship for a Puente student
- 1 transfer student scholarship of an Umoja student
- 1 transfer student scholarship for an Umoja student in Bernice Dandridge's memory

We want to thank our membership for their continuing generosity to the students of DVC.

A New State Senate Bill -



Divest From Fossil Fuel Holdings


The Fossil Fuel Divestment Act (SB1173), recently introduced by Sen. Lena A. Gonzalez, D-Long Beach, would require The California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) and the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) to divest from fossil fuel companies by 2027. Gonzales said the bill would help leverage the earnings of nearly 3 million active and retired public school teachers, college instructors, state and local employees in the effort to draw down greenhouse gas emissions and prevent the worst effects of climate change. The bill is co-sponsored by Fossil

Free California, the CSU Faculty Association, and Physicians for Social Responsibility (Sacramento and SF). Jann Jansen Apr. 15, 1935 - Sept. 4, 2021

We are sad to report the passing of Jann Jansen, retired English instructor. Jann was hired in 1985 as full-time faculty and taught until 2005 when she retired. She returned as adjunct faculty in 2006 and worked until 2016.

Following is a message from Jann's family:

On the morning of September 4th, 2021, Professor Emeritus of Diablo Valley College, Jann Jansen, passed away peacefully and was called to Heaven to join her daughter who had passed away long ago. As the matriarch of her family, she leaves behind seven children, twelve grandchildren, and fifteen great-grandchildren. Early in life, Jann explored several professions like acting, modeling, and becoming a concert pianist. However, her greatest passion was teaching. Jann Jansen had taught scores of students in primary and secondary school, but had also been a full-time professor of English at Diablo Valley College since the fall of 1985, and was tenured until 2005 when she retired shortly thereafter. She returned as an adjunct professor in 2006 and worked until 2016 after teaching for nearly 50 years of her life. She earned a Bachelor's Degree in Creative Writing and two Masters Degrees in literature and psychology. She not only published many newspaper articles but also wrote five books, including a trilogy of memoirs. Jann was also a piano instructor, once operated a small dog shelter, and was a lover of pets to many of her other animals including cats, birds, fish, frogs, and turtles.

Jann's long and storied life was riddled with many heartbreaking moments and painful challenges. However, she'd always persevere and overcome these many obstacles and hardships throughout her life... much to the chagrin of some of her naysayers. Jann went on to achieve much acclaim from many in the community for whom she served. She was an accomplished author, and greatly respected educator- being voted best teacher on many occasions.

Jann was an amazing woman who gave her everything to anyone in need. She brought joy, wonder, and inspiration to not just her many students, but also her many friends, and family. She had a talent for building and molding one's own self-confidence, and for helping motivate others to realize their full potential... especially those she taught- both young and old. Jann had both sass and charm, but it was her empathy and compassion that really shined through. It was often said that she cared more about others than she cared about herself. She was a beacon of light for those who were surrounded by darkness. Though she is no longer with us in physical form, we shall take comfort in knowing that her life was full of purpose and that she dedicated her life to helping others. Jann Jansen's influence and the long-lasting effect of her spiritual glow will remain in our memories and will help us hold fast to our own dreams- very much like she did to hers. May her soul rest in peace, and her memory live on in the hearts of those who were fortunate to be graced by her presence, her love, and her care.

I knew Kathy Reilly for over 30 years. I first worked with Kathy in the late 80's in the Assistant Dean of Instruction office, then we moved to the Vice President of Student Services office, then we moved to the President's office, then we moved back to the VP of Student Services office, then we agreed to retire on the same day, which we did happily. Kathy was my support, my protector, my editor, my information link, my partner, and my friend. Most of DVC knew Kathy for her exceptional organizational skills and superior competence. All of which, of course, was true but only a few also knew her wonderful sense of humor and her fun side like I did. We worked hard and we laughed loud. We truly enjoyed each other's company. I counted on her and she never failed to deliver anything and everything I needed. She often anticipated what I needed before I asked for it. We were partners and friends at work and we stayed in touch and remained friends after we retired. She was a gift to my life. I think of her often with a smile on my face and I will miss sharing time with her.
